

### St Mawes

St Mawes is the largest village on the Roseland Peninsula. An important port in medieval times, Henry VIII had St Mawes Castle, still beautifully preserved, built to protect Falmouth Harbour. The village found favour with early Victorian holidaymakers, not least due to the mild climate and air quality, characteristics which still attract visitors to the area today.

The village has a picturesque harbour; until the early 1900's fishing was a major occupation, particularly for pilchards. Supplies were needed for the fishermen and their families so small businesses, such as chandlers, boot and shoemakers, grocers and of course public houses, thrived.

Today the village has a small supermarket, post office, pharmacy, bakery, butcher, gift shops and galleries. You will also find a range of pubs, cafes and restaurants, plus all types of holiday accommodation, to suit all tastes. There is a recreation ground with a tennis court (bookable at the Roseland Visitor Centre), a skate park, zip wire, and family area, as well as traditional play equipment.

There are two fine beaches, one at each end of the village, with a range of water sports on offer. Kayaks, paddleboards and small boats are available to hire, and the Fal River ferries depart from the St Mawes harbour.

Lamorran House Garden is a four-acre subtropical, Italianate garden at the top of the village. It is situated on a south-facing slope on many levels, with lovely views across to St Anthony Head and beyond. The garden remains frost-free and therefore a wide range of plants from all over the world can be found, creating a gardener's paradise. It is open Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from April to the end of September. Due to the nature of the site, the garden is unsuitable for wheelchairs, and those with limited mobility may find they are limited to the upper levels only.

### St Mawes Castle

The Castle is set in landscaped grounds, with beautiful views over Falmouth Bay and the Carrick Roads. It is managed by English Heritage, with car parking available, and picnics are welcome in the grounds. Due to the nature of the site, which has some slopes and steep drops, wheelchair access is limited. You will find Bear Cornwall in the car park, a 1960's Citroen HY van, which serves coffee, cakes and savoury snacks.



## St Anthony Headland



One of the most popular trips from St Mawes is to take the Place Ferry from the Quay across to Place Manor. Looking back across to St Mawes from Place gives great a view of the village from a different perspective.

Crossing St Mawes Harbour and operating seven days a week, the Place ferry runs a regular service between St Mawes and Place Creek on the Roseland Peninsula. Along with the St Mawes Ferry, it forms an integral part of the South West Coast Path, saving walkers at least a day's extra walking.

There are a number of footpaths on the headland which will give you a choice of circular walks. For maps, ferry and bus times call in at the Visitor Centre before you go:

The most popular route is to turn right from the ferry and follow the footpath to the lane. Turn left up the lane and after about 300 metres watch out for the footpath on the right which will take you behind Place Manor, making sure you visit the beautiful and

atmospheric St Anthony's Church, which is administered by the Churches Conservation Trust (www.visitchurches.org.uk).

The coastal path, which is well signed, continues to the lighthouse at St Anthony's Head, which is owned by the National Trust (toilets available here).

From the lighthouse continue along the coastal path (Sections of the route are near to cliff edges. Always stay on the path and observe any signs which indicate cliff instability. This is particularly important in the area around Porthbeor).

When you reach Towan Beach (Porth Farm) leave the coastal path, turn inland, cross the road and the footpath continues from the rear of the car parking field along the creekside and back to the ferry. It depends on your own walking speed but you should allow at least four hours to fully appretiate this seven mile walk.



As an alternative, on reaching Towan Beach continue along the coastal path until you reach Portscatho. From New Road you can catch the bus back to St Mawes.

## Villages on The Roseland

A visit to **St Just in Roseland**, just two miles from St Mawes, is a must, with its 13th century Church, tidal creek setting and beautifully kept sub-tropical grounds; visitors are always given a warm welcome. Sir John Betjeman described it as being "to many people the most beautiful churchyard on earth".

It is about an hour's walk there from St Mawes (see next page), with a lovely tearoom, **Miss V's**, just by the Church.

St Just itself has a busy village hall and also a children's playground.

On the east side of the Roseland **Portscatho** was once famous for pilchard fishing. There are two pubs and cafes, together with a small supermarket and post office, and also serveral well-known galleries. **Gerrans**, up the hill above Portscatho, has a local Heritage Centre at the Old Forge which contains a wealth of information on the history of the area.

The church spire is a well-known landmark, which can be seen for miles around from land and sea. There is easy access to creek, county and beach walks from both villages.



Further east is the village of **Veryan**, famous for its five round houses, built around 200 years ago and surrounded by local folklore. Many say they were round so that there were no corners in which the devil could hide; in reality they were a show of wealth, the land owner having them built at the entrances to "his village".

**Portloe** is a delightful fishing village with a tiny working harbour sheltered by high cliffs, popular with walkers.

Tucked away inland are the sleepy villages of **Philleigh** and **Ruan Lanihorne**. Both have good pubs and interesting churches. The tidal creek at Ruan Lanihorne is a bird lover's paradise while leafy lanes and woods provide tranguil walks.



A thriving port before the river silted up, **Tregony's** wide main street features a restored clock tower and good pub and the village is often called the "gateway to The Roseland". **Tregony Gallery** is a well-known exhibitor of Cornish contemporary art.

## Circular walk from St Mawes to St Just Church



If you only do one walk when visiting the Roseland we would always recommend the five mile circular walk from St Mawes to the beautiful church at St Just. Call in to the Roseland Visitor Centre and ask for a St Mawes and the Roseland map before you set off. Leaving the car park, turn right and walk along the front past the shops and on up to the Castle. Leave the main road here, keeping the Fal estuary immediately to your left. The quiet private road becomes the footpath which continues through grassy meadows to **Pasco's** thriving boatyard. Keeping the water immediately to your left follow the path beyond the last boat shed which will bring you out at the secluded creekside church.

Rest here and maybe enjoy a delicious lunch, cake or a cream tea at **Miss V's**; you'll find this lovely cafe above the church by the car parks.

To return to St Mawes you can either retrace your steps along the coast or take the higher route along the ridge to enjoy far reaching views out to sea and across the Carrick Roads to Falmouth and beyond. This upper route is signed "To St Mawes Road" opposite the lychgate (toilets are here too) and involves a moderate climb. Following the well-trodden field paths which lie parallel to the road, you emerge at the water tower at the top of St Mawes and can then take quiet back roads down the village.

If you'd like to use the bus to halve the distance, it's best to take the bus from St Mawes and ask to get off at the turning for St Just Church (drivers will know where that is!). You then walk downhill to the church and then take either the ridge or creekside route back to St Mawes.

## Getting around The Roseland

Why not leave the car behind, even if only for one day? There are other ways to get around giving you time to enjoy the scenery whilst being more environmentally aware. You can plan some wonderful combinations of walks, boat trips and public transport.

St Mawes and the Roseland Peninsula are almost entirely surrounded by water - make the most of this by taking a trip on one of the Fal River Ferries. Enjoy the varied water sports such as kayaking, canoeing, sailing, windsurfing or paddle boarding. If you don't have your own equipment speak to Mark at **St Mawes Kayaks** on the quay.

The **St Mawes Passenger Ferry** provides a regular pedestrian link from St Mawes to Falmouth, operational year round, seven days a week.





**Public transport** There is a bus service connecting St Mawes and the villages on the Roseland with Truro. Check with the Roseland Visitor Centre for timetable details.

**Place Ferry** is a small seasonal passenger ferry which offers a regular service between St Mawes and Place from Good Friday to October, allowing visitors to explore St Anthony Head and to enjoy the beaches and circular walks on the headland (see page 7). Trips to Trelissick Gardens (National Trust) are also available during the summer season.

**King Harry Ferry** is a vehicle ferry crossing the upper reaches of the Fal near Philleigh across to Feock. This service operates daily. If you have a large campervan check with Fal River before you travel. For all the ferries, call in to the Roseland Visitor Centre to pick up timetables and discount youchers

## Car parking and going on foot!

The main car park in **The Square, St Mawes** TR2 5AG is run by the Parish Council and provides for both short and long stay parking. Tickets available cover one hour up to one week, and can be purchased with card or with cash. All tickets must be clearly displayed in your vehicle. Annual permits are available - ask for details at the Roseland Visitor Centre.

There are no designated campervan spaces in the car park. However, you are welcome to park across two adjacent car spaces provided payment is made for two spaces. Coach bays are available and are strictly for use by coaches.

Disabled parking spaces are available. Please refer to https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/transport-and-streets/parking for up to date information on current regulations.

There is limited additional parking on **The Quay, St Mawes** and also some on street parking but most of this is subject to time/duration restrictions. Check the notices before leaving your vehicle to avoid penalties.

Out and about on the Roseland there are small car parks in most of the villages, some free of charge, some charged. There are also beach and walkers' car parks throughout the area.



#### Going on foot

The Roseland is a paradise for walkers. Take a picnic and a whole day to enjoy a varied circular walk, or if time is short, strolling just a mile or two will be equally enjoyable. Being a peninsula there are a variety of coastal, creekside and inland routes, with spectacular views from the higher ground. We have maps, walking books and leaflets at the Roseland Visitor Centre. Our staff and volunteers can provide more details, such as accessibility of gates, stiles, terrain and even where it might be muddy! They'll also know where you can stop for refreshments, the best viewpoints and where you can access beaches.





## Beaches on The Roseland

Beaches on the Roseland are many and varied - sandy or pebbly, some with rock pools, some with easy access, others off the beaten track and secluded. **St Mawes** has two very good family beaches, **Tavern** and **Summers** beach, one at either end of the village. Both are excellent for swimming and the southerly aspect makes them ideal for sunbathing. Small beaches are accessible from the footpath between St Mawes and St Just in Roseland.

Head to St Anthony Head for National Trust beaches. **Great Molunan**, is a 15 minute walk from the lighthouse car park (where there are toilets). This secluded sandy cove is accessible from the coastal footpath or by boat. **Porthbeor** on the opposite side of the headland is only accessible by boat due to the instability of the cliffs. The beach is secluded and very quiet with rocky areas exposed at low tide. **Towan Beach** is a beautiful long sandy beach with rock pools at low tide. The National Trust provides car parking, and there is a cafe and toilets.

In Portscatho village **Tatams Beach** is a small rocky beach with sandy patches. Ten minutes' walk from the main car park is **Porthcurnick Beach** – this is a very popular beach, with the much-loved Hidden Hut café just above it, together with toilets.



Carne and Pendower beaches, owned by the National Trust, are wide sandy beaches which form one long expanse of sand at low tide. There are toilets and car parking at each end of the beach and **The Quarterdeck** at the Nare Hotel is open all day for light refreshments.

Further afield, **Portholland** has a tiny cove with rock pools. **Porthluney Beach** at **Caerhays** is a privately owned secluded family beach with an expanse of golden sand, parking and a beach side café.

#### **SEASIDE SAFETY**

- There are **no lifeguards** on our beaches.
- Look out for any safety notices before entering the water.
- Don't swim off headlands and be wary of undertow currents.
- Don't let children go out on inflatable airbeds or dinghies.
- Whenever possible get a friend to swim with you or keep an eye on you.
- Don't climb on cliffs or dig into cliff faces; they may collapse and bury you.
- Before walking along a stretch of beach below cliffs check to see what the tide is doing as you may become cut off.
- Observe any signs which indicate cliff instability.

In the event of an emergency for coastal or sea rescue **DIAL 999** and ask for the **Coastguard** 

## Dogs on the Roseland



Your dogs will love the Roseland and you will find that they are welcome almost everywhere. On **our beaches** dogs are currently welcome year round without their leads as follows:

- From St Just in Roseland to St Mawes Castle
- Idles Beach (down the slipway to the right of the Idle Rocks Hotel in St Mawes)
- Great Molunan near the lighthouse at St Anthony Head
- Towan Beach
- Porthcurnick Beach

There are seasonal restrictions in St Mawes on Summers and Tavern Beaches; see notices displayed. Also check the notices at Carne and Pendower as dogs are allowed but must be on their leads during the day in high season. Rules and regulations can change so if in doubt refer to www.cornwall.gov.uk

There are many miles of **footpaths** which your dogs will adore but:

 Keep them close or on their leads if you're near to cliffs

- The Roseland is an agricultural area so keep to the paths and always use a lead when passing through livestock fields
- Observe local notices relating to wildlife and nesting birds

Locals and visitors alike would all appreciate it if you "pick up" after your dog. We do have a lot of bins but they're not always as near as you might hope due to the accessibility for waste collection. Please resist the temptation to hang bags in trees, bushes or even on gate posts! It is a good idea to check on specific websites for dog rules but:

- Well behaved dogs are allowed on all of the ferries (be aware that you may need to left them aboard/ashore).
- You will also be welcome to all Roseland pubs, either in the bar areas or in the gardens/outdoor seating.
- Many accommodation providers also allow dogs to stay; there may be an additional charge so you should check when making a booking/enquiry.

And finally please remember, if left in cars, dogs can get overheated very quickly, even on overcast days.
